Education Update

The OklahomanUSA TODAY NETWORK
Published Aug. 6, 2023

- According to Kids Count's annual report, Oklahoma ranks 46th for overall well-being and 49th in education.
- The average Oklahoma teacher's salary is \$54,096.00. The average U.S. teacher's salary is \$64,133.00.
- The Oklahoma Department of Education reports that in the 2013-2014 school year there were 189 Emergency Teacher Certifications. In the year 2021 -2022, however, there were 3,616 Emergency Teacher Certifications.
- In 2020-2021 Oklahoma perstudent spending by fall enrollment was \$10,051.00. That ranks the state 46th nationally.
- The National Center for Education Statistics reports that the percentage of Oklahoma high school students that graduate on time is 81%; nationally the percentage is 87%.
- The number of Economically Disadvantaged students in Oklahoma is 390,820 or 56% of the total student population.
- The student-to-counselor ratio in Oklahoma is 374 to 1; however, The American School Counselor Association recommends a ratio of 250 to 1.

Yukon Sharing

Our October service project is Yukon Sharing. Yukon Sharing Ministry is a nonprofit organization started in 1982 by a small group of dedicated Yukon City Employees. Yukon Sharing is designed to help community members by supplying necessities for everyday living and resources necessary for independent living. They are in the heart of Yukon at 4 North 6th Street. Yukon Sharing is open Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday from 12:00 p.m.- 4:00 p.m.

Their mission is to provide a Hand Up to those in need. Many clients have had temporary setbacks due to unemployment or illness. Some clients are single parent families with one income barely able to pay the rent. Others are senior citizens and the disabled facing spiraling medical costs.

Yukon Sharing serves over 1,000 clients each year. They have partnerships with schools, churches, businesses, individuals and various community and state organizations to help provide food, clothing, small appliances, senior meals, emergency utility bills, rent and Christmas baskets.

Giving hearts, such as the members of this chapter, embody Yukon Sharing Ministry's efforts. It still makes their ministry as strong today as it was in 1982. In fact, Beta Beta sister Jaquita Icenhower serves on the Compassionate Sharing Board, which includes both Compassionate Hands and Yukon Sharing.

Little Free Library

In my neck of the woods, you see quite a few of these. They are called Little Free Libraries and according to their website, 150,000 Little Free Libraries in 120 countries have shared over 300 million books.

Little Free Library is a non-profit organization based in St. Paul, Minnesota. Little Free Library book-sharing boxes are open seven days a week, 24 hours a day and are freely accessible to all, removing barriers to book access. Their mission is "to be a catalyst for building community, inspiring readers, and expanding book access for all through a global network of volunteer-led Little Free Library book ex-

change boxes."

Maybe you are interested in becoming the librarian of your own Little Free Library. You can find plans for construction on the website or even purchase a box. Consider prebuilt shelves' height and depth, especially if you have children's or hardcover adult books. Also, it must be placed somewhere accessible to someone pulling up in a car or walking. You will be responsible for keeping the library in good condition and rotating books in and out. Waterproofing and a strong latch are also important. Kentucky Jam Cake By Faye Hess

Back in my home state of Kentucky years ago, my Aunt Pearl Stuard McFarland, made this "lovely cake" for our family gathering on Christmas night.

Kentucky Jam Cake with Caramel Frosting

1 cup soft butter
2 cup sugar
3 cups sifted all-purpose flour
1 tsp. baking soda
1/2 tsp. cloves
1 cup buttermilk
1 cup seedless blackberry jam

2 cup sugar
5 eggs
1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. allspice
1 cup raisins
1 cup chopped nuts



Fave Hess

Cream butter and sugar. Add eggs, one at time, beating well after each addition. Sift flour with soda, salt and spices. Add to creamed mixture alternatively with buttermilk. Stir in jam, nuts and raisins. Pour into 4 9-inch greased and floured cake pans. Bake at 325 degrees for about 35 minutes. Cool and frost.

Icing: 2 cups light brown sugar 1 cup granulated sugar

2 tbsp. corn syrup
2/3 cup cream
3 tbsp. butter
1 tsp. vanilla

Mix all ingredients in a saucepan and bring to a boil. Cover and cook for 3 minutes. Uncover and cook to 236 degrees on a candy thermometer or until a soft ball forms when dropped in cold water. Cool for 5 minutes; beat until thick and add a little hot water.

As of May 2022 over \$764,000 has been granted as Individual Professional Development Awards.

Professional Development is defined as a *growth-promoting learning process that empowers employed educators to further excellence in education*.

Things to Know About the Cornetet Individual Professional Development Award (CIPD):

- 1. CIPD awards are available for any employed educator, DKG member or non-member.
- 1. CIPD awards give individual educators the opportunity to participate in professional development activities through approved professional development providers such as colleges, universities, and professional organizations other than The Delta Kappa Gamma Society International.
- 3. CIPD awards are available to fund attendance at conferences, seminars, lecture series, online courses, workshops, and other non-degree programs.
- 4. CIPD awards may fund travel, lodging, meals, pay for substitutes, registration fees, etc.
- 5. CIPD applications are submitted electronically on or before November 1 for activities occurring between January-June.
- 6. CIPD applications are submitted electronically on or before May 1 for activities occurring between July-December.
- 7. CIPD professional development must occur after the funds are awarded.




